Mr Claude Jeannerot

Born in Besançon on 10 April 1945, Chevalier of the French National Order of Merit, Chevalier of the French Order of the Legion of Honour.

Current responsibilities

President of the Doubs Departmental Council since 1 April 2004
Departmental Councillor of the Besançon-Ouest canton (first elected March 1998)
President of the ANIL (French national association for information on housing)
Formerly Senator of the Doubs (Senator of the Doubs from 2008 to 2014, Vice-President of the Committee on Social Affairs), where he acted as rapporteur for several proposals (Jobs for the Future, Protecting Employment, Vocational Training, etc.)

Professional experience

After completing secondary and classical studies, Claude Jeannerot undertook higher education in philosophy, which allowed him to get his first job as a teacher. In 1971, he passed the competitive exam into ANPE (French national job agency), and has since devoted his entire career to the public employment service (ANPE and AFPA – French national association for vocational training).

After first working as a careers advisor at the Le Havre branch of ANPE, Claude was quickly promoted to the ANPE Managing Director's Special Advisor, as part of a team, for the creation of the ROME catalogue of professions and jobs. He was then appointed ANPE Departmental Delegate for the Doubs in 1976, then ANPE Regional Delegate for Franche-Comté in 1983.

In 1988, he joined AFPA (French national association for vocational training, Europe's largest public service body for vocational training with 12,000 employees) as Regional Director for Franche-Comté. Then, in 1998, he was appointed Deputy Managing Director, where he was tasked with overseeing the "Operations and Network Department" and international activity. He performed these duties until March 2004.

Claude Jeannerot joined the Besançon city council team in 1989.

He was Deputy Mayor for solidarity and social action from 1989 to 1995.

He was Deputy Mayor for economic development and tourism from 1995 to 1998.

Opportunities and challenges of global production networks



Mr Frédéric Lerais

Director, Institut de recherches économiques et sociales, France

Frederic Lerais was named Managing Director of the IRES on 1 September 2011. A former student of the Paris Graduate School of Economics, Statistics and Finance (ENSAE), and graduate of the University of Paris I Pantheon-Sorbonne, he has spent a significant part of his working life in the areas of research and the analysis of social and economic policy.

His career has taken him from the French Economic Observatory (OFCE), where he worked in the coordination of European policy, to the Directorate of Research, Studies and Statistics (DARES) of the Ministry of Employment, where he directed the economic analysis mission tasked with the economic context and analysis of the labour market and the evaluation of employment policy. He was member of the Bureau of European Policy Advisers (BEPA) of the European Commission, where he was responsible for social policy and consultation on "the social reality of Europe". From 2009, he was deputy Scientific Director of the National Institute of Research and Safety for the Prevention of Accidents at Work and Occupational Illness (INRS), where he was responsible for forecasting and analysis.

Federic Larais' research interests lie particularly in macroeconomics, the labour market and social security. He has also worked on questions relating to demographics, to well-being and to health at work.

IRES, which issues several different types of publication, such as La Revue d'IRES, La Chronique Internationale and La Lettre de l'Ires, organises various events with the aim of shedding specific light on important issues for social actors and public opinion.

Mr Raymond Torres

Director, Research Department, Institut International d'Etudes sociales, International Labour Office

Appointed as Director of the International Institute of Social Studies on 1 September 2007.

In 1984, Raymond Torres received a degree in mathematical economics and econometrics from the University of Paris I. In 1982, he also graduated from the Institut d'Études Politiques in Toulouse, France. He was a visiting lecturer in economics at the University of Paris-Dauphine.

Prior to joining the ILO, Raymond Torres worked for the Organisation of Economic Cooperation and Development (OECD), initially as an Economist in the Department of Economic Affairs and then as Senior Economist, before becoming Head of the Analysis and Labour Policy Division of the OECD. In the context of this last role, he was editor of the OECD Employment Outlook review and was responsible for the reassessment of OECD's employment strategy. He also oversaw the preparation of thematic reviews on older workers, which led to the publication of a series of 21 country studies as well as a summary report published in 2006, entitled "Vivre et travailler plus longtemps".

Mr Torres has also developed a new project on the transition from school to work and on young people's employment. He is the author of several studies on the labour markets, international trade, economic growth and on the basic rights of workers, including the 1996 OECD report on Trade, Employment and Labour Standards.

Between 1997 and 1999, he worked for the ILO as Head of the Special Team on the social dimension of globalisation, whose work culminated in the publication of seven studies per country and a summary report.

Professor Stephanie Barrientos teaches at the Institute of Development Policy and Management and is Associate Director of the Brooks World Poverty Institute at The University of Manchester. She was previously a Research Fellow at the Institute of Development Studies, University of Sussex (2000-7). She gained her BA and PhD in Political Economy at the University of Kent. She has researched and published widely on gender, global production, employment, decent work, trade and labour standards, corporate social responsibility, fair trade, and ethical trade. She has undertaken research in Africa, Asia, Latin America and the UK. She coordinated the Capturing the Gains Research Programme (with Prof Gary Gereffi) examining economic and social upgrading in global production networks (www.capturingthegains.org). She leads the Working Out of Poverty research theme in BWPI (www.bwpi.manchester.ac.uk/research). Stephanie has advised and provided training for a number of companies, NGOs and international organisations on issues concerning gender, agribusiness, ethical trade, decent work, and impact assessment, including: ActionAid, Body Shop, Cadbury Plc, CAFOD, Christian Aid, DEFRA, DFID, Gates Foundation, Green & Blacks, CAFOD, ILO, Oxfam, UNCTAD, UNIDO, World Bank, WIEGO, Women Working Worldwide and Unite. She is on the Advisory Groups of the ILO/IFC Better Work Programme, Traidcraft Board and NIKE EM initiative. Stephanie has a Leverhulme Major Research Fellowship (2013-15) examining gender and global value chains.

Mr Alakh N. Sharma

Director, Institute for Human Development, India

Professor Alakh N. Sharma is currently Professor and Director of the Institute for Human Development (IHD), New Delhi. Earlier he has worked in the capacity of Senior Visiting Fellow, Institute of Economic Growth, Delhi; Advisor (Research), V.V. Giri National Labour Institute, Noida; Professor, Shri Ram Centre for Industrial Relations, New Delhi; and a Faculty Member, A.N. Sinha Institute of Social Studies, Patna, for several years. He has made significant contributions to research in varied areas such as livelihoods, poverty, employment, labour markets and related issues.

During his academic career spanning over 25 years, he has directed/coordinated more than 30 research projects in the above areas, sponsored by various agencies including national governments, bilateral and multilateral agencies, and international organizations. He has also been a consultant to several international organizations such as ILO, UNDP and the World Bank. Professor Sharma has been closely associated with the policy-making processes involving employment, livelihoods and development in India, and has been a member of several high-level committees/task forces constituted by national and provincial governments.

He has authored /edited/co-edited 15 books and published over 30 research papers in various journals. He is also Editor of the Indian Journal of Labour Economics (IJLE), the quarterly journal of the Indian Society of Labour Economics (ISLE) and co-editor of the Indian Journal of Human Development (IJHD), a bi-annual journal brought out by IHD.

Professor Sharma is also credited with institution-building in India. His role in reviving and strengthening the Indian Society of Labour Economics (ISLE) and its quarterly journal, IJLE, is widely acknowledged among both economists and academicians. In addition, it is largely due to his efforts and vision that IHD, of which he is one of the founding members, has today become an important centre for research and studies on livelihood, employment and labour markets. Professor Sharma has also made valuable contributions in forging networks of researchers in the above areas in India and Asia, particularly in South Asia. Currently, he is leading a major research and network programme on Employment, Social Protection and Inclusive Growth in South Asia, which is being supported by IDRC (Canada), UNESCAP and ILO.

Ms Marie-Ange Moreau
Professor, University of Lumière Lyon 2

Marie-Ange Moreau is Associate Professor of Private Law. She has worked as professor at the IELT in Lyon 2 since 2010.

As a founding member of the Centre for Inter-University Research on Globalisation and Labour (CRIMT) in Canada, she has worked in close collaboration with Gilles Trudeau since 1989.

Since April 2013: Partial delegation to the National Research Agency (ANR) as Head of Programmes and Head Scientist in the Department of Human and Social Sciences (SHS).

Since 2012, she has been director of the Research Masters in Social Legislation and directs the Lyon International Seminar (SEMIL).

From 2003 to 2010, she held the Chair of International and European Social Legislation at the European University Institute in Florence.

Associate Professor of Private Law in 1986, Professor of the University of Rouen from 1987 to 1990, Professor of the University of Paris IV Dauphine until 1993, then at the University of Aix-Marseille III.

Director of the Social and Economic Law post-graduate programme at the University of Paris Dauphine, then of post-graduate programme in International Business Law at the University of Aix-Marseille III, Director of the Berthold Goldman Centre, attached to the Centre of International and Community Studies and Research (CERIC) at the University of Aix-Marseille III.

Her research interests, which lie in social policy, labour law and globalisation, the development of transnational standards, European social construction, fundamental social rights, new governance rules, social legislation and labour markets, have given her the opportunity to publish many reviews: *Droit Social*, *Revue de jurisprudence sociale*, *Journal of International Law*, *Revue internationale de droit économique* and *Relations Industrielles*. She has contributed to communications in several European and international congresses on labour law and industrial relations (1994, 2000, 2002).

Pauline Barraud de Lagerie is Senior Lecturer in Sociology at the University of Paris-Dauphine, researcher at the Institut de Recherche Interdisciplinaire en Sciences Sociales (IRISSO, UMR No. 7170).

A graduate of Sciences-Po (2003) and holder of a doctoral thesis in sociology (2010), she specialises in economic sociology. Her research focuses on the regulation of economic activities, and particularly on approaches to building "corporate social responsibility".

One of the original founders of the Clean Clothes Campaign, Ineke Zeldenrust has worked for the CCC in different capacities since it began in the Netherlands in 1989. Ineke has helped spearhead the campaign from its original beginnings into the global network it is now, covering over 250 partners worldwide with 16 European offices.

Currently Ineke acts as International Coordinator at the CCC International Secretariat. Her extensive expertise lies in the oversight of the CCC’s corporate accountability program including the development of company-related strategy and lobby work. Ineke also coordinates CCCs urgent appeal cases which work with partners throughout the world to bring about real change for workers on the ground.

Research in social sciences and the future of work



Mr Alain Supiot
Professor, Collège de France

Born in Nantes, with a PhD in Law (Bordeaux, 1979), associate professor of the Law Faculty (1980), Doctor Honoris Causa of the University of Leuven, Alain Supiot was initially professor at the University of Poitiers, then at Nantes (UMR-CNRS 6028), and senior member of the University Institute of France (2001), before being appointed to the Collège de France in 2012. From 1998 to 2000, he chaired the National Council for Development of Human and Social Sciences. His career has been marked by several years of foreign research (1981: Institute of Industrial Relations, Berkeley; 1989-1990: European University Institute, Florence; 1997-1998: Wissenschaftskolleg zu Berlin). In Nantes, he first founded the Maison des Sciences de l'Homme Ange Guepin www.msh.univ-nantes.fr, which promotes a transdisciplinary approach in the transformation of social cohesion. Then in 2008, he founded the Institute of Advanced Studies (IEA) www.iea-nantes.fr, which offers scientific residence facilities to scholars of every continent, working for a better understanding of the dogmatic framework of societies. After having directed the Institute from 2008 to 2013, he has since acted as chair of its strategic committee.

Alain Supiot is the author or joint author of 21 books, and has contributed to 37 collective works. He has published 67 articles in French and 69 in foreign languages. His work is mainly devoted to two complementary fields: social legislation and legal theory.

Mr Richard Locke
Professor, Watson Institute for International Studies/Brown University, United States

Richard M. Locke is the Howard R. Swearer Director of the Watson Institute for International Studies and a professor of political science and public and international affairs.

Locke's current research is focused on improving labor and environmental conditions in global supply chains. Working with leading firms like Nike, Coca Cola, Apple, and HP, Locke and his students have been showing how corporate profitability and sustainable business practices can be reconciled.

Locke has published five books – most recently *The Promise & Limits of Private Power*, Cambridge University Press (2013), based on his research on labor standards in global supply chains; *Production in the Innovation Economy*, with Rachel Wellhausen, The MIT Press (2013); *Working in America* with Paul Osterman, Thomas Kochan, and Michael Piore, The MIT Press (2001); *Employment Relations in a Changing World Economy* with Thomas Kochan, Michael Piore, The MIT Press (1995); and *Remaking the Italian Economy*, Cornell University Press (1995), as well as numerous articles on economic development, labor relations, and corporate responsibility.

At Brown, Locke teaches graduate and undergraduate courses on the political economy of labor and development as well as on global entrepreneurship. Locke was named a 2005 Faculty Pioneer in Academic Leadership by The Aspen Institute and awarded the MIT Class of 1960 Teaching Innovation Award in 2007 and the Jamieson Prize for Excellence in Teaching in June 2008. He currently chairs the Apple Academic Advisory Board, a group of independent academics who are working with Apple to improve labor conditions among the company's suppliers.

Mr Marcio Pochmann

Professor, University of Campinas (Unicamp), Brazil

Marcio Pochman (Venancio Aires, Brazil, April 19, 1962) is professor of economics at the Universidade Estadual de Campinas (Unicamp)

He graduated in 1984 in Economics from the Federal University of Rio Grande do Sul (UFRGS). Between 1985 and 1988, he completed his postgraduate studies in political science and was supervisor of the Regional Department of Statistics and Socioeconomic Studies (Dieese) in Brasilia, in addition to teaching at the Universidade Católica de Brasília. In 1989, he moved to São Paulo, where he began his doctorate - completed in 1993 - in Economics at the Universidade Estadual de Campinas (Unicamp), becoming a researcher at the Trade Union Center for Studies and Labour Economics (Cesit), and executive director some years later.

It was also visiting researcher in several universities in France, Italy and England, with postdoc in the areas of labour relations and youth policies.

He also served as a consultant in the Brazilian Service to Support Micro and Small Enterprises (Sebrae), the Federation of São Paulo State Industries (FIESP) and Dieese, among other national institutions. Internationally, he was a consultant in different multilateral UN bodies such as the International Labour Organization (ILO), the United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF) and the Economic Commission for Latin America and the Caribbean (ECLAC) among others.

From 2001 to 2004, Marcio Pochmann directed the Municipal Secretariat for Development, Labour and Solidarity in São Paulo.

Mr Olivier Favereau

Professor, University of Paris 10

Born on 28 May 1945 in Paris. Economist.

A graduate of the Institute of Political Studies, Paris (1967), Doctor and Teaching Fellow of Economic Sciences (1983) and Administrator at the Senat's Social Affairs Commission, in 1971 he joined the University of Paris Ouest-Nanterre La Défense as researcher. He lectured in economic sciences at the universities of Orléans, then Le Mans and finally at Paris Ouest-Nanterre La Défense, where he was appointed professor in 1988.

Specialising in the labour market and issues of employment, he is also interested in organisational theory and analysis of the corporate environment from an economic perspective.

Author of over 60 publications, he subscribes to the economics of convention. This movement, the subject of a collective edition of the *Revue économique* (March 1989), aims to bring economic theory closer to reality, in two ways: firstly by highlighting the importance (and the diversity) of rules and organisational forms to explain economic performance; secondly by integrating the input of other social sciences (sociology, cognitive psychology, management, law and political philosophy).

In 1991, he created a Research Master's programme in "The Economy of Institutions", along with the lecturers and researchers at Paris Ouest, the École des Hautes Études en Sciences Sociales and the École Polytechnique. From 1994 to 2005, he directed the associate research unit at the National Scientific Research Council (CNRS): FORUM (Foundations of Organisations and Regulations of the Business Sector) From 2000 to 2009, he was responsible for the "Economy, Organisations, Society" graduate school (co-accredited by the University of Paris Ouest-Nanterre La Défense and MinesParisTech), which brought together over 20 doctoral research groups (over half associated with the CNRS) on 4 disciplines: economics, management, sociology and contemporary history.

In pursuit of his pledge to position the Organization as a determined actor translating principle into action and capable of making a major difference to the working lives of people on all continents, he has launched a major reform process geared to assuring the ILO's authority on world of work issues.

Ryder joined the ILO in 1998 as Director of the Bureau for Workers' Activities. From 1999 to 2002 he was Director of the Office of the Director-General. During this time the ILO's Decent Work Agenda was launched and won support from the international community. He returned to the ILO in 2010 as Executive Director, International Labour Standards and Fundamental Principles and Rights at Work. Ryder has held posts at the International Department of the Trade Union Congress in London and in the international trade union movement. In 2002, he was appointed General Secretary of the International Confederation of Free Trade Unions (ICFTU), leading the process of unifying the democratic international trade union movement.
