

TO CELEBRATE THE WORLD DAY AGAINST CHILD LABOUR

The World Day against Child Labour, which is observed worldwide around the 12th June every year, is intended to serve as a catalyst for the growing worldwide movement against child labour National and international commitment is essential for progress in a time bound approach towards the elimination of child labour, as set out in the Global Action Plan of Global Report (May 2006). This commitment, that stems from the efforts of all partners, has been reflected in the huge number of ratifications of Convention No. 182 on the Worst Forms of Child Labour and Convention No. 138 on the minimum age for employment. In Geneva the main events to celebrate World Day will be on the 8th, 9th and 12th of June in conjunction with the ILO's International Labour Conference.
