



# Trends in ILO approvals in 2022

The past year has illustrated the strength of the ILO's partnerships as funding partners continued to contribute to the ILO's work despite increasing demand and competition for development cooperation funding. New approvals<sup>1</sup> of voluntary non-core funding in 2022 reached US\$381.4 million, an increase of almost 20 per cent from 2021, and the second highest total contribution in the past ten years. In addition, the ILO received US\$ 16.5 million in Regular Budget Supplementary Account (RBSA) funds, or voluntary core funding in 2022, from<sup>2</sup> the Netherlands, Denmark, Belgium, Norway, Sweden, Luxembourg, Germany, France and Italy.

Twenty funding partners accounted for 98 per cent of voluntary contributions, with Germany, the United States and the European Commission registering as the three largest contributors.

Looking beyond the ILO, the total amount of Official Development Assistance (ODA) increased in 2021 by 8.5%. This increase was mainly directed towards COVID-19 control and vaccine donations as well as humanitarian assistance and macroeconomic support activities. The global needs for ODA for development purposes continue to grow, meaning that global competition for such funds has remained strong if not increased. It is in this context that the continued commitment of the ILO's funding partners needs to be appreciated. Their support has been essential for the ILO's human-centred recovery responses from the COVID-19 pandemic in many of its Member States as well as allowing the ILO to continue to expand its service offer in support of social justice for decent work.

The ILO's promotion of social justice also requires the support of development and funding partners in the years to come. In particular, the themes of the ILOs' new Priority Action Programmes – transitions from the informal to the formal economy; just transitions towards environmentally sustainable economies and societies; decent work in supply chains; and decent work in crisis and post-crisis situations – as well as the Global Accelerator on Jobs and Social Protection for Just Transitions could be leveraged to build an expanded role for the ILO's development cooperation, which will be essential for realizing the Global Coalition for Social Justice.

The Office will continue to promote three funding modalities as reflected in the ILO Development Cooperation Strategy 2020-25 and in line with the UN Funding Compact: non-earmarked contributions; lightly earmarked and pooled funding; and earmarked funding. The Office will also continue its efforts to define its needs for additional partnerships and voluntary funding.



## Approvals highlights in 2022

 Average annual approvals have steadily increased since 2010. Total approvals for the period 2010-2013, on average, totalled US\$238.0 million per year. For the period 2019-22, average annual approvals reached US\$ 379.2 million thanks to record-setting years in 2019 and 2022.


# Approvals by funding source, 2022



- Accounting for 66 per cent of total approvals in 2022, multi-bilateral development partners remained the largest source of voluntary funding as in previous years. This was followed by the European Commission (13%) which channels EU member states contributions from the EC's budget, and the United Nations (10.1%). Aligning with trends observed in previous years, PPPs (4.7%) and Domestic Development Funding (4.2%) round out the top five sources of funding for 2022.
- For multi-bilateral approvals in 2022: 25.0% came from Germany, 21.8% the United States, 7.2% from Norway, 6.4% from the Netherlands and 6.3% from Switzerland reflecting above average contributions from all top partners, including a more than threefold increase in contributions from Germany.

Key areas funded include employment promotion, especially employment-intensive investments and skills development, and the fight against child labour and forced labour.

- The European Commission was the third the largest individual contributor to the ILO's approvals in 2022 (second largest in 2021). Its new approvals included a focus on ending child labour and forced labour as well as skills development.
- Approvals from the UN system were the fourth largest source of approvals in 2022, reaching US\$ 38.4 million, marking a decrease of about US\$ 8million from 2021, which was a record setting year for UN contributions. The UN portfolio is marked by an increasing number of inter-agency contributions as well as Joint Programmes funded by Multi Partner Trust Funds (MPTFs). These include several global programmes that have a thematic focus on employment promotion, enterprise promotion, skills development and labour migration issues. These approvals have included contributions from UNAIDS for the HIV/AIDS at the workplace programme, and other large inter-agency funded partnerships with several UN entities, such as with UNICEF, IFAD and UNDP.
- Approvals from non-OECD/DAC countries<sup>3</sup> in 2022 were about US\$3 million higher than in recent years thanks to contributions of US\$ 4.4 million from Brazil, US\$ 1 million from China, US\$ 500,000 from Kuwait and US\$ 327,000 from Panama.
- Public Private Partnership approvals totalled US\$17.8 million in 2022, aligning with the average observed in the past four years. This included significant private sector contributions for supporting compliance with international labour laws in textile supply chains through Better Work.
- Domestic Development Funding refers to funding by the government of a member State for ILO work in the country. As in recent years, this funding source, accounts for more than US\$16.2 million of approvals, or just over four per cent of total funding in 2022. This was thanks largely to contributions from Colombia, Pakistan, Cyprus, Saudi Arabia and Cambodia. This funding focused on skills development, contributions to the Better Work Programme and fostering the development of

- cooperatives. Contributions from an additional eight countries<sup>4</sup> were directed primarily to social protection.
- Approvals in 2022 included a focus on ending child labour (19.3%) and skills development (16.8%), which, alongside employment intensive investment (12.5%), enterprise development (7.2%) and social protection (6.3%) rounded out the top five areas of work.
- In 2022, 19.0% of total approvals were for Africa and 17.1% for Asia, followed by the Arab States (15.8%), the Americas (11.6%), and Europe (8.9%). In line with the increase in larger, multi-regional programmes observed in recent years, a significant percentage of approvals were also for interregional or global projects (27.5%). Contributions for the Arab States and the Americas were higher than the average for 2019-22, while approvals for Asia and Europe were steady and new resources for Africa and Global initiatives declined slightly.
  - Of the total of new approvals in 2022, 30% were financially managed by headquarters and 70% by the field. This distribution represents an almost six percentage point increase for the field compared to 2021.

#### For new approvals in 2022:

- In the <u>Africa region</u>, activities are mainly focused on ending child labour and forced labour, skills development and labour migration.
- In <u>the Americas region</u>, projects focus on ending child labour and forced labour and promoting skills development.
- In the Arab States region, projects have a strong focus on employment intensive investment and skills development.
- In <u>Asia and the Pacific</u>, activities are mainly focused on enterprise development and skills development.
- In <u>Europe and Central Asia</u>, there is a strong focus on skills development, employment promotion and supporting efforts to end child labour.

The following tables provide more detailed information about total voluntary non-core funding approvals in 2022. Many of the tables also provide a comparative overview of approval data for the period 2019-2022. Information is presented by source of funds, partner category, technical field, geographical distribution, administrative responsibility, and a combination of all the above.
